

#### Lock Every Door by Riley Sager

Lock Every Door is slow burn thriller that touches on overarching themes like poverty, broken families, classism, sacrifice, conspiracy, and gaslighting. If you're a fan of the Hotel season of American Horror Story or the "rules" creepypasta subgenre, then I highly recommend.

The story starts with the struggling orphan Jules Larsen as she stumbles through life and quickly becomes homeless after she catches her smooth-talking boyfriend with another woman. In addition to losing her job, things get pretty dire. Luckily, she manages to land an apartment sitting job at the elegant playground for the rich and famous, The Bartholomew. Despite having to agree to an odd list of rules, the job seems way too good to be true. After neighbors start to disappear and ghost stories run rampant, Jules quickly learns everything isn't quite what it seems at The Bartholomew.

#### **Gilded Cage** by Vic James

"Do those years when you're old, and you'll never get through them. Do them young, and you'll never get over them." *Gilded Cage* is a dystopian fantasy novel set in modernday Britain. It's the first in the Dark Gifts trilogy by Vic James. In this series, the author creates a terrifying world in which slavery still exists. In this world, Britain is ruled by equals, aristocrats with magical gifts called skill. All others are commoners who are forced to serve the equals as slaves for ten years. They can choose anytime between the ages of 10 and 65 to serve their years. The series follows two families, the Jardines, the most powerful aristocratic family in Britain, and the Hadleys. The two families' lives become entwined when the Hadleys are forced to serve the Jardines as slaves. It's a fantastic series full of dark magic, politics and romance.

#### The Exiles by Christina Baker Kline

The Exiles is a gritty adventure over sea and land that takes place through 19th century colonial Australia. It's a time when missionaries and prisoners alike are being thrown together to develop and settle a land during a harsh and vulnerable time. Several plots are interwoven to keep this story moving at an interesting pace. A group of British female prisoners, sentenced to a Tasmanian prison colony for crimes such as conceiving out of wedlock, are put on a repurposed slave ship and sent across the ocean. The trip is brutal, with several unexpected moments, but the women form unbreakable bonds of friendship and love. Meanwhile, an aboriginal orphan born in Australia is taken in by a high society family as an experiment to see if she can be assimilated. Eventually these separate paths converge, and the lives of these women are forever changed as they learn to navigate this whimsical, yet harsh experiment that is a developing Australian society. For those curious about the colonization of Australia, this book is a must-read. It is also a book that captures the historical vulnerability of women in society and the incredible strength of the human spirit.


## National Comic Book Day is September 25th, and you can celebrate it anywhere with your Library and Hoopla!

# THE PEOPLE AND THE SCHOOLS

**Boley Elementary** is named for the Boley family who provided the land where the school is located. Jane Boley, once enslaved, purchased the property in 1866. Her descendants include Marion F. Boley (1856- 1936) and Naomi Boley Willis (d. 1973).

**J. S. Clark Magnet** is named for Dr. Joseph Samuel Clark, first president of Southern University who served from 1913 to 1938. Dr. Clark was also president of the National Association of Teachers in Colored Schools in 1916 and was superintendent of the Louisiana State School for Negro Blind.

Madison James Foster Elementary is named for Madison James "M. J." Foster (1877-1954) who came to Ouachita parish around 1909 to serve as principal of the North Louisiana Industrial School. During his 40-year career as an educator, he worked with the Shreveport Normal school for teachers and was principal of Monroe Colored High. Professor Foster was a past president of the Louisiana Education Association and an instructor at the United Theological Seminary in Monroe.

Area schools are sometimes named for communities, streets and people. Schools like Martin Luther King Jr., Carver and Jefferson are named for famous Americans. Others are named for local citizens who contributed to Ouachita Parish History. In previous issues of Cattails, Barkdull Faulk, Henry Carroll, Julia Wossman, B.D. Robinson, Ernest Neville and J.P. Crosley have been included. View past issues at www.oplib.org. A few others are listed below.



Prof. M. J. Foster, served his fellowman in teaching profession forty-five years. Twenty-five as principal of the Monroe High school.



Clara Hall Elementary is named for Clara Wendel Hall (1893- 1958) Miss Hall graduated from Ouachita Parish High School in 1912 and was a talented musician who taught music at the city schools from 1921 to 1954. The Monroe News-Star of May 18, 1912 listed the graduates that year and wrote of Miss Hall, not being present to receive her diploma as she accompanied her parents to Baton Rouge to attend her father, Luther Hall's, inauguration as governor of Louisiana.

Jack Hayes Elementary is named for Jack Hayes who was principal of the Ouachita Parish High School for 41 years from 1908 to 1949. His wife was librarian at the school, and they were both honored for their contributions in 1954 by the Ouachita Parish Alumni Association.

Sallie Humble Elementary is named for Sallie Graham Lacy Humble (1863- 1957). Mrs. Humble was a fourth-grade teacher at Central Grammar School for 35 years from 1902 to 1937. She was educated at the Ouachita Female Academy in Monroe, and she taught at the Ouachita Male Academy, in private and public schools in Caldwell Parish and in the Monroe City High School. She retired in 1937 and was the first teacher in the Monroe City School system to retire.

Minnie Ruffin Elementary is named for Minnie Markette Ruffin (d. 1945), a teacher, principal and Dean of Girls at Monroe City and Neville High Schools from 1909 to 1941.

Roy Neal Shelling Elementary is named for Roy Neal Shelling (1940-2017). Mr. Shelling graduated from Carroll High School and Grambling. He taught at Carroll Jr. High, was assistant principal at Lee Junior High and Carroll Jr. High and was principal at Lincoln Elementary. He retired in 2002 after 38 years in education.

Lida Benton and Georgia Tucker are no longer grammar schools but are remembered by many. Lida Benton was named for Lida St. Clair Benton (1857-1938) who taught at the colony school near Swartz, was a principal in Mer Rouge and headed the departments of English and Literature in Monroe City High School. Georgia Tucker was named for Georgia Anna Tucker Stubbs (1838-1894), the mother of Colonel Frank P. Stubbs. Col. Stubbs donated the land where Georgia Tucker was built to the city of Monroe for use as a site for a public school.

Several schools are named for educators who worked together in the early days of public education. A listing of school faculty in the September 5, 1911 *Monroe News-Star* included from the Monroe City System E.L. Neville, superintendent; Miss Lida Benton, English; Mrs. Minnie Ruffin, history; Miss Julia Wossman, 7th grade; and Mrs. Sallie Humble, 4th grade and from the Ouachita Parish system T.O. Brown, superintendent and Jack Hayes, principal.
